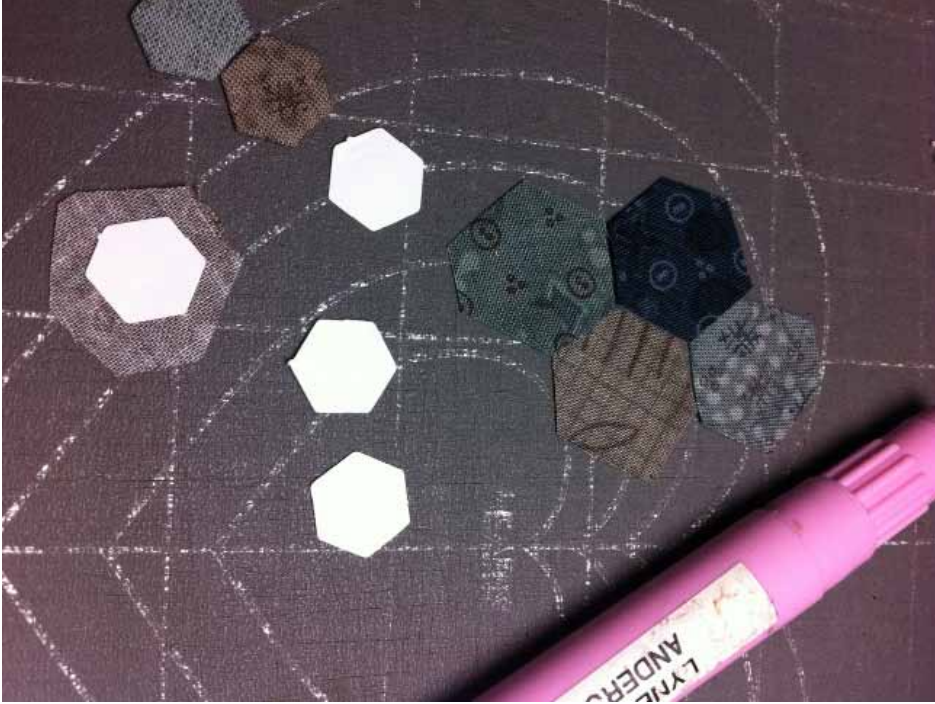


Hexagon Tutorial



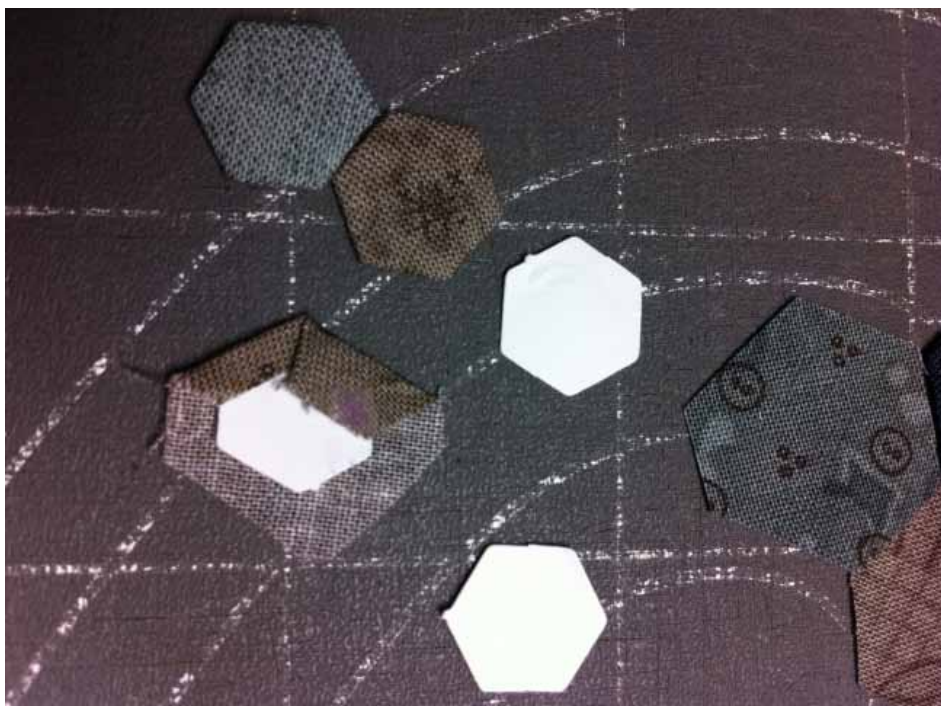
1. Place the paper hexagons on the wrong side of assorted fabrics and cut the fabric out approx. $\frac{1}{4}$ beyond the paper.



2. If you have a glue pen such as a Sewline© now is the time to use it! Place a small amount of glue on one of the edges of the paper template.



3. Bring the fabric over the edge of the paper and press onto the glue.



4. Repeat with the next side of the hexagon and continue until you have done all six sides.



5. Prepare 7 hexagons this way and then arrange the 6 hexagons in a flower.



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6. Using a fine needle and regular machine thread stitch the hexagons together by sliding the needle through the fabric, taking care not to go through the paper.



7. When you want a random look to your hexagons, use a flat surface to lay them out in an arrangement that you like. I find it useful to use sticky tape to hold the hexagons in place once I have decided what layout I like. I also label the rows, then I can take my hexagons to my sewing group without fear of them getting out of place.
